Schools are required to teach British values as part of their responsibility for promoting the Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural (SMSC) development of their pupils. In doing this they can also show that they are 'actively promoting fundamental British Values.'

At the heart of these values, lie good relationships in which teachers and students work together towards common goals. Much work was already in place to support and embed these values and it is our aim to ensure we effectively share this with pupils, staff, governors and the wider community. These values are integral to our school vision and ethos and are

reinforced regularly. The British Values are defined as:

- Democracy
- The rule of law
- Individual liberty
- Mutual respect

Tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs.

Mutual respect	<ul> <li>To support children/young people in working cooperatively with one another and</li> </ul>
	respect one another's opinions and views.  • To help pupils to acquire an understanding of, and respect for, their own and other cultures and ways of life

- Assemblies focussing on a different value every other week
- Collective Worship

- Behaviour for learning policy
- Participation in community events
